During his official visit to China from December 2nd to 5th, Nepal's Prime Minister, KP Sharma Oli met with President Xi Jinping and held bilateral discussions with Chinese Premier Li Qiang. The meeting between Nepal and China resulted in the signing of nine agreements, including an agreement for the construction of the Tokha-Chhahare tunnel, an agreement to enhance Nepal-China trade, and a commitment to provide USD 20 million in cash assistance. In a statement, President Xi Jinping highlighted Nepal's importance in China's regional diplomacy, affirming Beijing's willingness to collaborate with Kathmandu to push for progress in their strategic partnership. Although the joint statement expressed a willingness to sign the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on the Trans-Himalayan Multi-Dimensional Connectivity Network (THMDCN) and the BRI cooperation framework "as soon as possible," both nations have yet to set a firm date for signing the revised BRI deal.

India's high commissioner to Dhaka, Pranay Verma, was <u>summoned by Bangladesh</u> on December 3rd to discuss a security breach at their assistant high commission in Agartala. After meeting, Mr Verma said, "we have such a wideranging and multi-faceted relationship with Bangladesh that you cannot reduce it to one issue or one agenda." The Indian Ministry of External Affairs in press release condemned the breach of the Bangladesh assistant high commission premises in Agartala, describing the incident as "deeply regrettable" and stressed that diplomatic and consular properties should not be targeted under any circumstance. Meanwhile, Security has been beefed up in areas surrounding the <u>Indian High Commission in Dhaka</u> after an organisation named Bangladesh Civil Society has announced a programme to besiege it. India has also strengthened security along the <u>Bangladesh border</u> in the eight districts of northern West Bengal. The UK government has updated its <u>travel</u> advisory for <u>Bangladesh</u>, warning about potential terrorist activities amidst concerns over attacks on religious minorities in the country.

Philippine and Chinese Coastguards have reported conflicting versions of a maritime confrontation around the contested Scarboroough Shoal in the South China Sea, the latest row in a longstanding dispute between the two neighbours. On December 3, the Philippine Coast Guard (PCG) said Chinese Navy and Coastguard vessels had taken "aggressive actions" against a routine patrol by it and the fisheries bureau. In a statement by the PCG spokesperson, said that the Chinese Coastguard fired a water cannon at a PCG vessel "aiming directly at the vessel's navigational antennas," The incident follows a diplomatic spat in November after China drew baseline "territorial waters" around the shoal, which Beijing claims as Huangyan Island.

On <u>December 3</u>, Singapore and Australia agreed to seek opportunities for increased access to their respective defence facilities, including more frequent Australian visits to the city-state's air force and navy bases. During a ministerial visit to Singapore, Australian Defence Minister Richard Marles said, the two countries are set to announce an upgrade to their Comprehensive Strategic Partnership next year, including plans for closer military collaboration. During the meetings, Singapore's <u>Foreign Minister Vivian Balakrishnan said</u> a stronger defence partnership would be the key cornerstone of the new 'Comprehensive Strategic Partnership (CSP) agreement'. The agreement between the two countries is set to be held when they celebrate 60 years of bilateral ties, with other areas of cooperation being food security, energy and climate change.

The <u>13th edition of Joint Military Exercise AGNI WARRIOR (XAW-2024)</u>, a bilateral exercise between the Indian Army and Singapore Armed Forces, concluded at Field Firing Ranges, Devlali (Maharashtra) on November 30, 2024. The three-day exercise conducted from November 28 to 30, 2024, witnessed participation by the Singapore Armed Forces contingent comprising 182 personnel from the Singapore Artillery and the Indian Army contingent comprising 114 personnel from the Regiment of Artillery.

XAW-2024 aimed to maximise mutual understanding of drills and procedures to achieve jointness as a multinational force under the United Nations Charter. The exercise showcased joint firepower planning, execution and use of New Generation Equipment by the Artillery of both Armies.

In an unprecedented move, South Korea President Yoon Suk Yeol <u>declared</u> "emergency martial law" in an unannounced television address on December 3. He accused the opposition of sympathising with North Korea and paralysing the government with anti-state activities. After the declaration of martial law, South Korea plunged into political turmoil, with parliament swiftly rejecting the move and protests erupting across the nation. Yoon's own party leader, Han Dong-hoon, the National Assembly speaker <u>opposed the move and declared</u> the measure invalid. In a rapid response to the martial law declaration, the South Korean National Assembly convened and voted unanimously to reject the martial law order. This vote effectively nullified the president's decision. Martial law was withdrawn within six hours of announcing it. It was the first time since 1980, that martial law was declared in South Korea.

China banned exports of "dual-use items" related to gallium, germanium, antimony and superhard materials to the United States with immediate effect. This move came a day after Washington's latest crackdown on China's semiconductor industry, curbing exports to 140 companies, including chip equipment maker Naura Technology Group, and opens new tab. The ministry also added, a stricter review of end-usage for graphite dual-use items to the United States is required. The curbs will strengthen enforcement of existing limits on critical minerals exports that Beijing began rolling out last year, but apply only to the U.S. market,

Japan <u>deployed</u> a surveillance aircraft and a naval vessel responded after sighting of a Russian submarine. The Russian Kilo-class submarine was located approximately 50 kilometres south of Yonaguni Island, which is Japan's westernmost territory situated just east of Taiwan. Accompanied by a Russian naval ship, the submarine was observed moving northeast between Yonaguni and the nearby Iriomote Island. This marks the first instance of a Russian submarine being detected in these waters, according to statements from Japan's Joint Staff.

The Sunni Islamist group Hayat Tahrir al-Sham (HTS) swept into the city of Aleppo in Syria on November 30, marking its first major <u>assault on President Bashar al-Assad's regime</u> since 2020. Syria has redeployed its army in the region while the Russian Air Force conducted airstrikes in Aleppo and Idlib in support of the Assad regime. In a joint statement issued on December 1, the US, UK, France, and Germany emphasised <u>the need for de-escalation</u>, the protection of civilians, and a Syrian-led political solution to the conflict in accordance with UNSCR 2254.

Continuing the deepening of a <u>special strategic partnership</u> between the UAE and Saudi Arabia, Emirati President Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan and Saudi Crown Prince and Prime Minister Mohammed bin Salman Al Saud met in Al Ain on December 1. During their meeting, the Saudi Crown Prince extended greetings on the occasion of the UAE's 53rd National Day (Eid Al Etihad) and the two sides discussed possible ways to further develop their bilateral relations. Major issues discussed included strengthening Gulf cooperation, advancing joint efforts towards regional security and stability, fostering Arab cooperation, and pursuing a just, comprehensive, and lasting two-state solution to the Israel-Palestine conflict.

Meanwhile, French President Emmanuel Macron met Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman Al Saud in Riyadh on December 2. The two leaders signed a <u>strategic partnership agreement</u> aimed at deepening their bilateral relations and working together to de-escalate conflicts in the region, including helping to consolidate the fragile ceasefire between Israel and Lebanon. Reportedly, France and Saudi Arabia intend to co-host an international conference on the <u>establishment of a Palestinian state</u> in June 2025.

US President-elect Donald Trump warned Hamas that if the remaining Israeli hostages held in Gaza were not released before January 20, the <u>US would strike</u> <u>Hamas and its backers harder</u> than ever before.

On November 28, Kazakhstan hosted a summit of the Collective Security Treaty Organization (CSTO), including a meeting involving the leaders of the Russialed military alliance's member states. Following the meeting, the heads of state inked 14 separate documents, including a declaration in which they declared their commitment to develop further the CSTO and their intention to continue interaction between member states. The members approved the <u>Declaration of the Collective Security Council</u>.

Prior to the CSTO meeting, Russia-Kazakhstan talks took place at the Akorda residence, on November 27. Following the consultations, the presidents signed a joint statement; several intergovernmental, and business documents were also signed. Vladimir Putin and Kassym-Jomart session of the 20th Russia-Kazakhstan addressed the plenary Interregional Cooperation Forum in Ufa, via videoconference. During the discussions, Vladimir Putin and Kassym-Jomart Tokayev deliberated on the advancement of the strategic partnership and alliance the Russian Federation and Kazakhstan across diverse domains.

On <u>December 1</u>, Member of the Political Bureau of the CPC Central Committee and Foreign Minister Wang Yi chaired the fifth China-Central Asia Foreign Ministers' Meeting in Chengdu. The five foreign Ministers of the Central Asian countries attended the meeting. The <u>ministers discussed</u> economic cooperation, regional security challenges, transportation and logistics cooperation, climate and environment, and the growth of cultural and humanitarian ties. Additionally, they agreed to strengthen cooperation in environmental sustainability, including water resources, renewable energy and environmental protection. The officials stressed the need to implement joint infrastructure projects, simplify trade procedures, stimulate investment within the Belt and Road Initiative, strengthen measures to combat terrorism, extremism, and transnational crime, and coordinate efforts in cybersecurity.

On November 28, 2024, the Ministries of Defence of India and the United Kingdom <u>signed</u> a Statement of Intent (SoI) in Portsmouth for cooperation on design and development of an electric propulsion systems for the Indian Navy. This agreement was part of the third Joint Working Group Meeting of the Electric Propulsion Capability Partnership. The SoI establishes a framework for co-design, co-creation, and co-production of electric propulsion capabilities for future naval vessels, including Landing Platform Docks (LPDs) that are planned to be constructed at Indian shipyards.

The Indian Navy conducted a narcotics seizure – combined <u>operation</u> with the Sri Lankan Navy in the Arabian Sea. Following intelligence from the Sri Lankan Navy, extensive surveillance was conducted using Long Range Maritime Patrol Aircraft and Remotely Piloted Aircraft, with inputs from the Information Fusion Centre in Gurugram. The operation successfully intercepted two Sri Lankan-flagged fishing vessels involved in narcotics smuggling and resulted in the seizure of approximately 500 kg of crystal meth and the apprehension of nine crew members.

On December 3, 2024, the Defence Acquisition Council (DAC) granted Acceptance of Necessity (AoN) for five capital acquisition proposals totalling over ₹21,772 crore. Among these proposals is the procurement of 31 New Water Jet Fast Attack Crafts (NWJFACs) for the Indian Navy, designed for low-intensity maritime operations, surveillance, patrol, and search and rescue missions close to the coast. Additionally, the DAC approved the acquisition of 120 Fast Interceptor Crafts (FIC-1), which are versatile vessels capable of escorting high-value naval units such as aircraft carriers and destroyers.
