Maldives Foreign Minister Abdulla Khaleel visited India <u>from January 2-4</u>, during which he held bilateral talks with Indian Minister of External Affairs Dr S Jaishankar. In a statement, Khaleel <u>acknowledged</u> India's steadfast support in addressing the Maldives' financial challenges, stressing the importance of their collaboration for the country's long-term economic stability. The two nations signed a memorandum of understanding to launch the third phase of the High Impact Community Development Projects (HICDP). On January 7-8, <u>Maldivian</u> <u>Defence Minister</u> Mohammed Ghassan Maumoon is visiting New Delhi for bilateral talks with his Indian counterpart.

The Taliban and Pakistan continued to clash across different stretches of the Durand Line. On January 3, the clashes erupted in, Alisher district of Khost. Earlier, Pakistani <u>airstrikes on villages</u> within Paktika province on December 24th caused the deaths of 46 or more people; women and children were among the victims. Following media inquiries on January 6th concerning the airstrikes, India's foreign ministry spokesperson, Shri Randhir Jaiswal, <u>denounced the attacks</u>, asserting that Pakistan has a history of deflecting blame for its internal problems onto its neighbours.

Bangladesh has <u>withdrawn its judicial officials</u> from participating in training sessions scheduled at India's Judicial Academy. The program, initially planned for February 10-20, was cancelled as per directives issued by the Bangladesh Supreme Court. Fifty judicial officials—Assistant Judges, Senior Assistant Judges, and District and Sessions Judges—were initially approved to attend a program, but it was subsequently cancelled. The initiative was part of a bilateral agreement signed during Sheikh Hasina's 2017 visit to India.

Indonesia has formally joined BRICS as a full member, further expanding the group of major emerging economies. On January 6, Brazil, which holds the bloc's presidency in 2025, said the member states approved Indonesia's entry by consensus as part of an expansion push. "Indonesia shares with the other members of the group support for the reform of global governance institutions and contributes positively to the deepening of cooperation in the Global South," the Brazilian government said.

On January 6, the Philippines deployed air and sea assets of its <u>military</u> and coast guard in its exclusive economic zone to monitor China's largest coast guard vessel, calling the ship's presence an act of Chinese "intimidation, coercion and aggression." According to the Philippine coast guard, the 165 m (541 ft) long vessel 5901, referred to by the Philippines as "the monster," was 65 to 70 nautical miles off the coast of the province of Zambales on January 6.

On January 8, Malaysia announced tax incentives to draw investments to the Johor-Singapore Special Economic Zone (JS-SEZ), including a 5 per cent tax rate for companies investing in high-value activities. In a joint statement, the Ministry of Finance and Johor state government said the special 5 per cent tax rate for 15 years is for companies investing in qualifying manufacturing and services activities such as those involving artificial intelligence and quantum computing supply chain, medical devices and aerospace manufacturing.

U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken <u>visited</u> South Korea on January 6, 2025, amid significant political upheaval following President Yoon Suk-yeol's controversial declaration of martial law and subsequent impeachment. During his visit, he met with Foreign Minister Cho Tae-yul and Acting President Choi Sang-mok, reaffirming the United States' "ironclad commitment" to South Korea. Discussions also focused on enhancing trilateral cooperation among South Korea, Japan, and the U.S. This is Blinken's second visit to Seoul following the third Summit for Democracy (S4D) hosted by the Yoon administration last year.

On January 7, 2025, Japan's Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba met with US Secretary of State Antony Blinken in Tokyo. The visit comes after North Korea conducted ballistic missile tests, raising alarms about regional security. Blinken expressed worries about the <u>deepening ties between</u> Russia and North Korea, especially regarding potential exchanges of military technology that could enhance North Korea's missile programs. Blinken addressed these issues during his earlier meetings in Seoul. During the meeting, Blinken highlighted the significant progress made in the US-Japan alliance, including a recent arms sales approval for \$3.6 billion worth of medium-range missiles and related training.

Taiwanese <u>officials suspect that</u> the Shunxin-39, a Chinese-owned vessel, is involved in severing an undersea fiber-optic cable near Keelung Harbor. A Taiwan telecom company, Chunghwa Telecom, reported that internet services were minimally affected due to the swift rerouting of communications. This cable, known as the Trans-Pacific Express, connects Taiwan to major regions including South Korea and the U.S. This is not the first time Chinese vessels have been implicated; in February 2023, two Chinese ships were linked to severing cables near Taiwan's Matsu Islands.

Ahmed al-Sharaa, the leader of the new Syrian administration, met with German Foreign Minister Annalena Baerbock and French Foreign Minister Jean-Noël Barrot on January 3 in Damascus. France and Germany called for a <u>peaceful</u>, <u>inclusive political transition in Syria</u> that involves all ethnic and religious groups, with equal participation from both men and women. While expressing the EU's support for Syria's transition, the two leaders warned that "Europe will not finance Islamist structures". Meanwhile, Syria's interim Foreign Affairs Minister Asaad Al-Shaibani visited Saudi Arabia, UAE, and Qatar. The Gulf nations reaffirmed their support for Syria. Asaad Al-Shaibani sought Gulf support for Syria's economic recovery and <u>urged the US to lift sanctions</u>.

On January 6, the US lifted sanctions on transactions with the Syrian government for six months in order to facilitate the <u>flow of humanitarian</u> <u>assistance to Syria</u>. It aims to ensure that sanctions do not hinder essential services or the continuity of governance in Syria.

Following the collapse of the Assad regime, <u>Iran has withdrawn most of its</u> <u>forces</u> from Syria, dealing a major blow to its regional ambitions. The Assad regime was a key component of Iran's "axis of resistance" against the US and Israel. Meanwhile, the outgoing Biden Administration notified the US Congress of a planned <u>USD 8 billion arms sale to Israel</u> that includes 500-pound warheads, precision-guided munitions, artillery shells, missiles for jets and attack helicopters, bomb fuses, and air-to-air missiles to intercept projectiles.

In a wide-ranging interview on January 3, President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev addressed Kazakhstan's foreign policy, reflecting on the dynamics of relations with Russia, China, and the United States. President Tokayev stated that his "primary goal is to strengthen the economic potential, sovereignty, and international standing of our state". He further addressed that he would continue Kazakhstan's multi-vector balanced foreign policy. President Tokayev further reiterated the decline of the international system, describing it as "increasingly degrading" and "marred by mutual accusations among major powers". The United Nations Security Council remains "paralyzed," he noted. He stated that this "unhealthy" situation raises concerns among nations like Kazakhstan as it hinders economic and social progress.

On January 2, aviation experts said that Russian air defense fire was likely responsible for the Azerbaijani plane crash the day before that killed 38 people and left all 29 survivors injured. On January 6, Azerbaijan's President Ilham Aliyev once again blamed Russian officials for the plane crash that killed 38 people on Christmas Day and called for them to be punished. President Aliyev said, "I can say with confidence that the blame for the fact that Azerbaijani citizens died in this disaster lies with the representatives of the Russian Federation".

The <u>Aktau crash</u> of the Azerbaijan Airlines Embraer 190 aircraft, which killed 38 people on December 25, was a tragic event with significant international repercussions. As investigators sought to determine its cause, Kazakhstan faced an important decision regarding the handling of the <u>flight recorder</u>. Ultimately, the country chose to <u>transfer the recorder to Brazil</u> on January 6, the manufacturer of the aircraft, rather than to the Interstate aviation Committee (IAC) of the Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS), as Russia had <u>proposed</u>. By taking this decision, Kazakhstan adhered to established industry procedures for aviation safety investigations. Such a step highlights the country's commitment to transparency and global norms.

On January 4, the French Carrier Strike Group, which includes the nuclearpowered aircraft carrier FNS Charles de Gaulle along with its escort vessels, a frigate, a submarine, and supply ships, <u>arrived in</u> Goa. The group is set to conduct a Passage Exercise (PASSEX) at sea with the Indian Navy's Western Fleet before continuing to participate in Exercise La Perouse in Indonesia and Exercise Pacific Steller in the Pacific Ocean. Additionally, the Charles de Gaulle CSG and Indian Navy ships <u>will take part in</u> the 42nd annual Varuna bilateral exercise. Meanwhile, the French naval ships FS Forbin and FS Alsace, also part of the Carrier Strike Group, are visiting Kochi to engage in professional interactions with the Southern Naval Command. This visit <u>is part of their</u> <u>deployment</u> in the Indian Ocean under Mission CLEMENCEAU 25.

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh is <u>set to hold a bilateral meeting</u> with his Maldivian counterpart, Mohammed Ghassan Maumoon, who will be on a three-day visit to India from January 8 to 10, 2025. The two ministers will review the bilateral defence relations, such as training, joint military exercises, defence projects, workshops, and the supply of defence equipment to bolster the capabilities of the Maldives National Defence Forces (MNDF).
