

After the March 11th attack on the Jaffar Express train in Balochistan, Pakistan's Parliamentary Committee on National Security (PCNS) convened on March The committee underscored the critical need for immediate implementation of counterterrorism frameworks, including the National Action Plan (NAP) and the Azm-i-Istehkam military operation, to effectively mitigate terrorism. In addressing the rise of terrorism, Pakistan's Chief of Army Staff, General Asim Munir, highlighted systemic governance deficiencies and proposed the transformation of Pakistan into a more secure and controlled entity. The Pakistan Army <u>accused India</u> and Afghanistan for the Jaffar Express attack. In response to these accusations, Indian and Afghan authorities countered that Pakistan should focus on its own problems rather than deflecting blame.

On the margins of the Raisina Dialogue, a bilateral discussion was held in New Delhi on March 18 between Nepal's Foreign Minister, Arzu Rana Deuba, and India's External Affairs Minister, Dr. S. Jaishankar. The discussions encompassed a review of recent high-level diplomatic exchanges, collaborative efforts in trade and transit, and advancements in hydropower development between both nations. In the course of the discussions, Minister Deuba confirmed Nepal's commitment to enhancing its bilateral ties with India, underscoring the nation's readiness to engage in cooperative ventures of shared interest.

Intelligence sharing and expanding cooperation in the US-India strategic partnership were the focus of meetings between US Director of National Intelligence Tulsi Gabbard and India's National Security Advisor Ajit Doval during Gabbard's March 16-18 trip to India. Gabbard also participated in the India-hosted intelligence chiefs' meeting, led by Doval. Closed-door discussions addressed counterterrorism strategies, transnational criminal activity, and global security challenges such as the war in Ukraine and conflicts within the Middle East. Ms. Gabbard also held a meeting with Prime Minister Modi and Defence Minister Rajnath Singh. In a television interview conducted during her visit, Gabbard voiced apprehension about the persecution and killing of Hindus and other minorities in Bangladesh. She further noted the Trump administration's resolve to address Islamist terrorism worldwide. The interim administration of Bangladesh repudiated these remarks.

The second phase of the 31st edition of Exercise Cope Tiger is being held at Korat Air Base and Chandy Range, Thailand, from March 17-28, 2025. The trilateral exercise between the Republic of Singapore Air Force (RSAF), the Royal Thai Air Force (RTAF) and the United States Air Force (USAF) is being conducted in two phases. The first phase was a Command Post Exercise, held at the Multinational Operations and Exercise Centre in Changi Naval Base, Singapore, from December 17-19, 2024. The exercise allows participating countries to execute air defence, strike and UAV operations to enhance combat readiness and operational capabilities.

On <u>March 18</u>, Secretary of Foreign Affairs of the Philippines Enrique A Manalo said that the Association of Southeast Nations (ASEAN) has a duty to serve its own people and ensure the region's development. Speaking at Firstpost's IdeasPod as part of the annual Raisina Dialogue organised by ORF in partnership with the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA). Manalo said, "India is definitely a very valuable partner. India's Indo-Pacific strategy, which is now, gaining much greater shape and the participation of India in our region, practically coincides with our view of ensuring a free and open Indo-Pacific".

Singapore has <u>redrawn its electoral boundaries</u>, expanding the number of parliamentary seats and realigning wards that were previously hotly contested, as the country inches closer to a critical general election. The changes were announced in a new electoral boundaries report, meant to take into account shifts in voter population, completing yet another step in the lead-up to a general election that must be held by November. Prime Minister <u>Lawrence Wong</u> will be seeking a mandate for his leadership for the first time since he was selected by the ruling People's Action Party (PAP) in 2022 to take over from Lee Hsien Loong, son of founding prime minister <u>Lee Kuan Yew</u>.

The Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi met with Russian Deputy Foreign Minister Ryabkov Sergey Alexeevich and Iran's Deputy Foreign Minister Kazem Gharibabadi in Beijing on March 14, where he proposed <u>five points on the Iranian nuclear issue</u>. Emphasising the need for peaceful political and diplomatic solutions as opposed to force and sanctions, Wang Yi urged for a balanced approach to nuclear non-proliferation and Iran's right to peaceful nuclear energy under the NPT. He reaffirmed the JCPOA as the foundation for negotiations, calling the US to return to talks. China further opposed UNSC intervention, warned against the snapback mechanism, and advocated for a step-by-step, reciprocal approach based on mutual respect.

Amid rising tensions in the Indo-Pacific, Taiwan's Ministry of National Defence reported that <u>26 PLA aircraft sorties were detected</u> on Monday, March 17, with 20 crossing the median line of the Taiwan Strait and entering Taiwan's northern, central, southwestern, and eastern air defence zones. The incursions were part of air-sea joint training exercises involving PLA-N vessels, prompting Taiwan's forces to upturn monitoring and retaliatory responses accordingly. Taiwan also reported PLA aircraft and naval vessel movements on Sunday. China has even ramped up cognitive warfare against Taiwan by establishing a dedicated misinformation unit, as reported by Taipei Times. PLA Eastern Theatre Command head Lin Xiangyang reiterated China's stance on Taiwan, stating that its military remains on high alert and ready to fight against any moves toward independence, marking the 20th anniversary of the Anti-Secession Law.

Director-General for International Security Youn Jong Kwon met with Benedikta von Seherr-Thoss, Managing Director for Peace, Security, and Defence at the EEAS, to discuss expanding ROK-EU security cooperation. Building on the 2023 summit agreement and the 2024 ROK-EU Security and Defence Partnership document, both sides agreed to hold an ROK-EU Security and Defence Dialogue in Seoul in the first half of the current year, entailing discussion on defence industry collaboration, security assessments, hybrid threats, and critical infrastructure development. They also deliberated on key issues such as disarmament, cybersecurity, and maritime security and also agreed to hold a Cyber Policy Consultation in the time ahead. The meeting further underscored the increasing correlation of the Indo-Pacific-Europe



security landscape, reaffirming the need for deeper ROK-EU security cooperation as 2025 marks the 15th anniversary of their strategic partnership.

After nearly two months of relative calm since the ceasefire with Hamas, Israel resumed airstrikes on Gaza on March 18, reportedly killing more than 400 people. The US supported Israeli airstrikes, asserting that President Trump had made it clear to Hamas that they must release the remaining hostages immediately or face severe consequences. Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu informed that he had ordered the strikes in Gaza following Hamas' rejection of proposals for extending the ceasefire and urged Gazans to evacuate. Meanwhile, the US conducted a series of attacks on Iranian-backed Houthi targets in Yemen (Hodeidah port city) on March 15 as the Houthis continued their attacks on US ships and other nations, disrupting legal commerce for all seafaring nations.

According to the US Department of Defence, the military's Central Command (CENTCOM) will continue to <u>use "overwhelming, lethal force"</u> against the terrorist Houthis, who have shown no interest in stopping attacks against US targets in the Red Sea. President Trump, on his part, warned that <u>Iran would be held responsible</u> for any attacks carried out by Houthi rebels in Yemen.

On March 17, the European Union hosted its ninth Brussels Conference on "Standing With Syria: Meeting the Needs for a Successful Transition", mobilising EUR 5.8 billion with international support to assist Syria with its inclusive transition and reconstruction. Among other leaders, the EU's High Representative for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy, Kaja Kallas, and Syria's interim Foreign Minister Assad al-Shaibani attended the event.

On March 17, President of the Republic of Tajikistan Emomali Rahmon held a meeting with President of Russia, Vladimir Putin. They discussed prospects for expanding bilateral relations of strategic partnership and alliance with a focus on trade, investment, cultural and humanitarian cooperation. They exchanged opinions on key regional issues. Various intergovernmental agreements were signed which included the Strategic Partnership Programme of the two countries' Defence Ministries for 2026–2030, the Agreement between the Ministry of Industry and Trade of Russia and the Ministry of Industry and New Technologies of Tajikistan on cooperation in the industrial sector.

On <u>March 12</u>, US Secretary of State Marco Rubio spoke with Kazakhstan Deputy Prime Minister-Foreign Minister Murat Nurtleu to emphasise the US commitment to Kazakhstan's independence, sovereignty, and territorial integrity, and a closer bilateral relationship.

Kazakh President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev chaired a meeting of the country's Security Council on March 18 to review the results of the 2024 implementation of the Action Plan for National Security Risk Management for 2021-2025, which was adopted to implement the National Security Strategy. Tokayev emphasised the importance of assessing the National Security Strategy based on concrete results that benefit society, ensuring that the development of all sectors incorporates considerations for the security of citizens and the state as a whole.

India and Bangladesh <u>concluded</u> the Naval Exercise Bongosagar 2025 and Coordinated Patrol (CORPAT) in the Bay of Bengal on March 13. The exercise saw participation from INS Ranvir, a guided-missile destroyer of the Indian Navy, and BNS Abu Ubaidah, a frigate from the Bangladesh Navy. The drills focused on improving joint operational capabilities through surface firing, tactical manoeuvres, underway replenishment, and Visit-Board-Search-Seizure (VBSS) cross-boarding exercises. The exercise provided the opportunity for both navies to develop closer links in tactical planning, coordination and information sharing for undertaking seamless maritime operations.

The Indian Coast Guard's Offshore Patrol Vessel ICGS Saksham <u>made a port call</u> at Antsiranana, Madagascar, on March 18, 2025. This visit reinforces India-Madagascar maritime cooperation in the Indian Ocean region. During its stay, the crew of ICGS Saksham will engage in joint training sessions with the Madagascar Coast Guard, focusing on marine pollution response (MPR), maritime search and rescue (M-SAR) and maritime law enforcement. ICG personnel will also conduct specialised training on marine MPR, focusing on handling oil spills, chemical spills and marine pollution incidents to enhance Madagascar's preparedness for environmental emergencies.

On March 13, 2025, DIG Shatrujeet Singh, Commanding Officer of Indian Coast Guard Ship Saksham, paid a courtesy call on Mr. Sylvestre Radegonde, Seychelles' Minister for Foreign Affairs and Tourism, as part of his visit to Indian Ocean countries. Discussions during the meeting focused on enhancing collaboration in maritime security, and India's vital assistance in addressing shared challenges to maintain security and stability in the Indian Ocean Region. He appreciated India for donating the patrol boat 'Boudeuse' on February 25, 2025. DIG Shatrujeet Singh proposed expanding cooperation into pollution control response efforts with the Seychelles Coast Guard. Indian Navy will also participate in Seychelles' National Day Parade this year.
